

## Curriculum Vitae

Hanns W. Maull (born 1947) since 1991 holds the Chair for Foreign Policy and International Relations at the University of Trier. He studied Political Science, Modern History and Communications in Munich and London. His previous positions include Research Fellowships at the International Institute for Strategic Studies in London (1973-1974) and the Sussex European Research Centre of Sussex University (1975-1976). From 1976 to 1979, Hanns Maull served as European Director of the Trilateral Commission. He then worked as Economics Editor with one of Germany's Public Broadcasting Corporations (1979 -1982) before embarking on his academic career, with academic positions at the Universities of Munich (1982-1987) and Eichstätt (1987-1991). He also taught as Visiting Professor (from 1986 to 1992) and as holder of the Stephen Mueller Development Chair for German Politics (1997/1998) at the Johns Hopkins University Bologna Center. From 1991 to 1993, Hanns Maull also served as the Co-Director of the Research Institute of the German Society for Foreign Affairs.

Since 1979, Hanns Maull has represented the Japan Center for International Exchange in Europe; in this capacity, he has co-organised the series of European-Japanese Conferences known as Hakone Conferences. He co-founded the European Council for Security Co-operation in Asia-Pacific (ECSCAP) and the Council for Asia-Europe Co-operation (CAEC). He has written over a dozen monographs (including "Community-Building with Pacific Asia", a Report to the Trilateral Commission, co-authored with Charles Morrison and Akira Kojima) and, most recently, a study on the North Korean nuclear problem) and has published about two dozen editions - most recently on German foreign policy and European-East Asian relations ("Europe and the Asia Pacific", edited with the late Gerald Segal and Jusuf Wanandi). He has contributed extensively to scientific journals (including articles in "Foreign Affairs", "Politique Etrangère", "International Affairs" und "Chuo Koron"), edited volumes and to the opinion pages of dailies such as the Internatioanl Herald Tribune or the Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung.

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
